

CONCEPTION and FERTILITY ELECTIONS

This is an area that many astrologers have dabbled with, but to the best of my knowledge very little has been written on it. A fascinating realm of astrology, yet this is one that needs to be approached with **great** caution. Though I have worked with conception charts and related fields for more than 20 years, I am learning something new with every horoscope, and as the medical field pioneers new methods day after day, to the point where a woman after menopause can give birth...so we in the astrological world have to keep step. Thus regard this chapter only as an overture, with the opera still to be written.

First of all we need to divide that which we do know into three parts:

- 1) **BIRTH CONTROL** as based on the *Fertility Cycle*
- 2) **THE BEST TIME TO BECOME PREGNANT**, based on the astrological fertility cycle, as well as on the woman's natural ovulation.
- 3) **PREGNANCY CHARTS** based on the latest medical advances in child conception.

The Fertility Cycle:

The ancients established that there seemed to be a connection between the distance of the Sun to the Moon in a woman's chart and fertility. Just as the female body goes through menstrual cycle, so the natal chart seems to indicate those times when a woman is most receptive to pregnancy, namely that moment approximately once a month when the Sun is at the exact distance from the Moon as it is at birth. For example, if your natal Sun is at 15 Cancer 40 and your natal Moon at 23 Scorpio 55, the distance between the two luminaries is 128 degrees and 15 minutes. Approximately every 30 days the Sun and Moon will be at a point where they are separated by 128 degrees and 15 minutes.

Dr. Eugen Jonas, a Czechoslovakian gynecologist and astrologer worked with this fertility cycle in his astrological birth control clinic for many years and supposedly successfully helped people to conceive as well as to prevent conception. This latter theory was particularly intriguing to modern couples who wanted to freely pursue sexual activities without resorting to such intrusive measures as birth control pills or interuterine devices.

1) Birth Control

Some astrologers have assumed that if you know the day of your greatest fertility, by adding two or three days before and after, you have secured a fertile period and therefore the remaining days of the cycle should be infertile and safe. **Please understand right up front that this method of birth control is totally unreliable and not recommended.**

a) In today's world where the average woman has taken many artificial substances, from asperin to birth control pills, there are very few whose natural cycle coincides with her astrological one and the expected 'safe' times may be when her natural ovulation takes place, a great time to get pregnant!

b) Even if you are fortunate enough to be in synchronicity with nature, nobody can predict exactly how long it takes the semen to travel up the birth canal to inseminate the egg or at times "lay in waiting" in the tubal area for the egg to be receptive. Medicine says the semen can live for 48 hours, but some doctors report that they know of cases where insemination took as much as 60 hours, thus the safe day count can be off. Of course the same can happen when your usually regular ovulation occurs a day early, but than it's a natural, not astrological problem. In other words, do not use this cycle to ensure birth control.

Best time to get pregnant

So why do I burden you with all of this useless knowledge? Because the other side of the coin, namely the time when to get pregnant, has proven to be most helpful. I have worked with the "fertility cycle" for many years now and have had some very positive results. Please understand, this has NOTHING to do with the BIRTH of the child, only with the PREGNANCY.

About 20 years ago when I first became interested in this fertility cycle, I had many young women clients who wanted to get pregnant at certain times which fit into their work schedule, such as teachers who wanted a summer baby and my role was simply to find their fertile days for October or November. There were quite a few clients who did not want too much time to lapse between their first and second child; those who had lost a baby during pregnancy and wanted to know if I could help avoid a repetition; and some women who had trouble conceiving.

Though I have had many successes, I have also had failures and more than anything else, I have learned great respect for nature and am sure that if something does not succeed, it is often because it is not supposed to succeed. Therefore I never promise results, I only offer to try and help to the best of my ability. The nicest part of this astrological method is that the client does not have to undergo any medical procedure; there are no pills to be taken, no diets to adhere to...the only demand is to have sex at a certain time of the day, and that is usually not considered a hardship. As a result I have been able to make quite a few astrological and psychological deductions which have helped many clients achieve viable pregnancies.

The **mechanics of calculating fertility cycles** are very easy, ACS will send you dates and times for one year, some astrological software, (Pathfinder for example) has a program, and if you have nothing better to do, you can figure it manually, like we did B.C. (before computers!) Handout You can see what my fertility data sheet looks like. It prints out 13 dates for one year and the time on that day at which the fertility peaks, which of course is the exact moment when the Sun and Moon are equi-distant to their position a birth.

Once you have this data, you run charts for all 13 dates. Be sure to calculate which time zone your client will be in for the year, and if the couple travel, adjust the times given accordingly.

Natural ovulation, the time when the egg is ready to be impregnated, lasts about one day; most doctors figure around 20 hours. To be on the safe side, I tighten the astrological period to 12-14 hours or 6-7 hours on each side of the given time. After carefully studying the charts, I consult with the client as to which of the 13 possible days are deemed good, which are fair to middling and which I consider problematic, such as squares from the Moon to Mars and Uranus or an opposition to Saturn.

The Rules for interpreting a fertility chart are very simple. It is, in its own way, a type of Electional chart, and since we are dealing with conception, everything is based on the Moon. Primarily, you must check all the applying aspects the Moon makes in the chart and secondarily, the aspects it makes to the natal chart. Since learning is easiest with examples, let's look at a fertility cycle I ran for a client way back in 1976.

My client **Mindy** (chart #1) had been married for 2 years. She had worn an interuterine coil which had led to bleeding. Once it was removed, somehow she could not seem to get pregnant. She had also moved from California to Switzerland, which had added physical and emotional stress, often a reason for not being able to conceive. As I do with every client, I also counseled that she follow her natural ovulation with a temperature chart or however her doctor suggested and take advantage of that day as well.

Here is the actual list as it prints out the data: (Handout)

The first chart on this list is for August 24, 1976 at 3h27m20s am MET (-1 zone) for Zurich, Switzerland. Since Switzerland is on daylight saving time in August, I used 4:27:20 am MEDT. (See chart #3). Though computers and software programs are quite reliable, we who input the data are humans and as such we do err. **PLEASE, make sure that the distance between Sun and Moon is the same as it is in the natal chart.** Mindy's natal separation is 17 degrees and 54 minute minutes. It should be the same in every fertility chart you calculate for her. The distance from the Moon at 13 Leo 09 to the Sun at 1 Virgo 04 is 17 degrees 55 minutes. (A 1 minute difference often exists because most computers do not print out seconds for the Sun or Moon, so it is automatically rounded up or down, which accounts for a 1 minute disparity.) In chart #4 the Moon is at 11 Virgo 44, the Sun at 29 Virgo 38, a distance of 17 degrees 54 minutes.

Though the Moon is only at 13 Leo, it makes but one applying aspect, a trine to the MC. It is 3 degrees 21 minutes (approximately 7 hours) past a conjunction to Saturn. I suggested that they should not have intercourse before 10:00 pm the evening before, after the Saturn conjunction, and everything was alright through 10:00 am on the 24th. That provided a 24 hour window. The Moon at 13 Leo falls into Mindy's natal 8th house, it will quincunx the natal Sun, conjunct Pluto, sextile Neptune, quincunx Jupiter, oppose the Moon and its last aspect was a sextile to the MC. I consider this an o.k. chart, not particularly good or bad. I like more action in the fertility chart and I am not keen on an opposition to the natal Moon, but none of it is so problematic that I would counsel Mindy to skip that particular date.

Result - she did not get pregnant.

The second date given (Chart #3) is for September 22, 1976 at 2:45:33 pm MEDT for Zurich. Here the Moon is at 11 Virgo, just past the square to Neptune by 27 minutes or less than 1 hour in actual time. The Moon applied to a square to the Ascendant, a conjunction to Mercury and last but not least, to the Sun. Natally the Moon still falls in Mindy's 8th house. It will quincunx Venus and oppose the Sun as well as Jupiter. Again, not a great chart. I was particularly worried about the square to the Ascendant (Mindy's body) but we could not wait for that aspect to pass, since moving the Moon 11 plus degrees take 22 hours, longer than the fertility is in effect. I needn't have worried...Mindy's husband was called out of town and nothing happened anyway! Nothing happened during her

ovulation period either.

The third date (Chart #4) for October 21, 1976 at 11:45:58 pm MET shows the Moon at 10 Libra. Do you notice how the Moon is always in the next sign, and always a bit earlier than the time before. (13 Leo in August, 11 Virgo in September, 10 Libra in October). This is the normal pattern for fertility charts.

The Moon first sextiles Neptune and conjuncts Pluto, then sextiles Saturn, conjuncts Mercury, opposes the MC and finally there is a lovely conjunction to the Sun, ending with a quincunx to Jupiter. I really liked this chart, and though I am not always fond of Pluto's intensity in electoral charts, I really like Moon/Pluto conjunctions for fertility purposes. After all, Pluto rules reproduction. I did wonder about the opposition to the MC in 11 1/2 degrees.

Natally the Moon at 10 Libra was in Mindy's 9th house, ready to oppose Venus, quincunx the Sun, sextile Pluto, quincunx Jupiter and end with a trine to the natal Moon. Quite nice.

As stated, I discuss all 13 charts with my client, including some possible problems. We also talk about the fact that some men have problems performing on command at a set time. If the woman seeks a consultation alone, we frequently discuss this problem and I often advise her not to share the time schedule with her partner. If the couple both come to see me, I may suggest that they have a party or somehow celebrate the event, anything to avoid stiffness or embarrassment.

Mindy got pregnant on October 21st. She fell off a step stool while painting the future baby's room on January 8, 1977 - exactly 11 1/2 weeks after conception. (The Moon/MC opposition I had wondered about). Thank God she was not seriously hurt, a painful ankle, but the baby wasn't touched. She had a strapping boy on July 10, 1977.

Two questions I hear again and again: "Can we predict the baby's gender?" and "Can we predict anything about the baby from the conception chart?" After carefully comparing about 75 birth and conception charts, not an in depth study of thousands, but enough for a start, I must say that I see NOTHING that links one chart with the other. Not the conception Moon to the natal, the Ascendant to the luminaries or any other links between the conception chart and the birth chart of the child.

As to predetermining the baby's gender - the answer is yes and no. If you look at the conception chart (#5) of October 21st, you will note that the Moon was in Libra, a 'male' sign astrologically speaking. If insemination takes place while the Moon is in Libra, or Aries, Gemini, Leo, Sagittarius and Aquarius, the baby should be male. Unfortunately we do not know when insemination takes place. As I previously said, it can take the semen more than 48 hours to fertilize an egg; in that time span the Moon may have entered the next, feminine sign. The answer at best is maybe.

Another interesting case was a charming Greek woman, **Marissa**, living in Monte Carlo in the summer of 1980 when she consulted me. (Chart #5, Marissa). Monaco may be an exquisite place, but it has a pretty bad reputation when it comes to medical care. Marissa had a 4 year old son and had been trying to conceive since early 1978, with no success. Both she and her husband had been tested and found o.k. When I calculated her fertility cycle, we discovered that most the

peak days seemed to fall during those weeks where she was expecting her period which had been pretty regular.

Of the 13 dates, only two were really favorable. This unfortunately can happen and, in fact, once I had to tell a client that the year she had chosen had but one 'good' date.

Here is the first 'favorable' time: (Chart #6).

The Moon at 23 Capricorn 23 will of course square the Sun, as it should, since that is the natal distance. But after that it will sextile Uranus and trine Jupiter, a nice aspect for a conception chart.

Natally the fertility chart Moon squared the natal Moon, not so good, but it fell in the 3rd house where it would conjunct the natal Sun, an ideal aspect for this type of election. I suggested that she should not have intercourse until after 4:15 am (see chart #8) at which time the Moon had advanced to 23 Capricorn 39, past the square to its natal position at 23 Aries 31, but still applying to a sextile to Uranus and trine to Jupiter of the fertility chart.

The other favorable date, if you wish to look at the chart, was 12/15/1980 at 1:52 am in Monte Carlo. We don't have to study it, because she got pregnant on October 17, and yes, she had her period that day and the doctor to this day does not understand how it could possibly happen. I don't know the answer, but I have since urged many of my clients not to let anything stop them. After all, it can't hurt and it may work. Marissa had a healthy baby girl, called Marion in my honor, on July 9, 1981.

In the seventies and early eighties I calculated many successful fertility charts, but in those simpler days, before complex conception methods became popular or affordable, I also had some failures. Some clients came back two or three years in a row without good results. I felt terrible for them and very inadequate for myself. Then one day, actually my first case was in 1984, a client wanted to know if I could help astrologically to assure an *in-vitro* fertilization, since each time cost \$10,000 and so far two *in-vitros* had failed to bring the desired results. And this brings us to

Pregnancies through new medical procedures. What I have learned since 1984 is relatively uncomplicated. Most of the new methods such as *in-vitro* or *artificial fertilization* depend on dates given the patients by the doctor. In 95% of the cases I have dealt with, there is a 48 hour window where the patient can decide for herself when she wants to have the procedure done. This 48 hours is the only time we, the astrologers, have to work with.

Obstetrics has become such a specialized field that most obstetricians work in pairs and either are located right next to a clinic they work with (not necessarily for giving birth, just for conception procedures) or they have labs on their premises. This means they can do whatever needs to be done at any time of the day, and in some cases, night. Most of my clients, none of whom were emergency cases, have given me a 14 hour day (from 6 am to 8 pm) to work with. In the 40 plus cases I have worked with so far (again, not a great number as far as research goes, but enough to give food for thought) the closer the insemination was to the astrological fertility date, the better the results.

Quite a few times I was able to convince my client to skip a month, realizing

that her natural ovulation was moving toward the astrological peak day. This happens rather frequently, since many women ovulate every 27 or 28 days, while the astrological cycle is more or less 30 days.

I have also learned that when a client is totally out of synch with the astrological cycle and on a 30 day rhythm, in other words no way of getting closer to the desired dates, then I will do diurnal charts for the two or three days per month given me by the client and choose the best one. I do not try to find the best time for a particular day until the doctor actually orders my client to be ready (usually 24 hour notice), otherwise I would duplicate a lot of work, since every fertilization is different and does not take the same amount of time.

Another intriguing bit of learning came with the realization that it does not seem to matter when the eggs are taken from the ovaries or when the husband's sperm is added, it does not even matter when the eggs become fertile, the moment that checks out time and again is **when the fertilized egg is implanted.**

Take the case of Sarah in New York. She had gone through a failed in-vitro fertilization in February of 1985. She was nearly 33 years old, depressed, panicky and \$12000 poorer. Her doctor said she could try again in April, May or June. The two days each she gave me for April and May did not look as good as the ones for June 15 through 18 she and the doctor had figured on.

This is **Sarah's** natal chart (Chart #8 - 4/10/52 at 8:31 am EST in Stamford, CT) Here's what actually happened. She went to the clinic on June 15, 1985 at 7:30 am EDT. They collected quite a few of her eggs and added her husband's sperm at about 12 noon. Originally the doctor had planned to implant the eggs on the 17th in the early afternoon, I had told her that any time after 9:30 am would be fine. But the evening before they called and asked her to be there at 9:00 am. At 10:00 am on June 17th they implanted the fertilized eggs. (Chart #9)

When she called me with the change of plans, I was holding my breath, since you can see that at 9 in the morning the Moon was still applying to an opposition to Uranus which it only passed by 9:30 am. Thankfully the Universe cooperated and the procedure started only at 10:00 and by then the Moon had advanced to 15 Gemini 50, just past the opposition. The Moon's next aspect was a trine to Jupiter, then a sextile to the Ascendant and best of all, a conjunction to the Sun. In her natal chart this Gemini Moon sextiled her Pluto, Sun and Jupiter, and trined her Neptune, Moon and Ascendant. A wonderful chart. Not that the Moon/Uranus opposition would have indicated a loss of the baby; in fertility charts, oppositions, except maybe to Saturn, do not seem to imply separation as they can do by progression or transit. But Uranus often plays tricks, and that's the last thing you want in such a delicate procedure as in-vitro.

The pregnancy was beautifully uneventful, and as you may have guessed (I did) when you saw a Gemini Sun and Moon, she had twin boys, the first one weighed 6 lbs 10 oz and the second one, born 2 minutes later, weighed 5 lbs 6 oz.

Jennifer was a happy-go-lucky 21 year old when I first met her. (Natal chart 10) She was living with her boyfriend, finishing her college education and sure that she wanted to be "a career girl all the way." After our initial consultation, we met on a yearly basis for an update and she also kept me busy with event charts concerning college tests. She never wanted to get married or have children, and had two abortions.

But along came Roberto, a good looking Italian, as romantic as his name sounds. It was love at first sight and they married in 1984. Jennifer earned her master degree, passed the State Boards and settled down to life as a Marriage and Family Counselor. By 1988, age 34, she realized that without a baby she would never feel completed. Roberto felt the same way. She got pregnant twice, once at the end of 1988 and again in 1989. Each time she carried the baby for over three months and the loss was really major, both psychologically and physically.

Finally her family convinced her to seek help with a fertility specialist. He decided to try artificial insemination, using her husband's sperm and implanting it into the mouth of the birth canal. The procedure was done on July 12, 1990 at 2:30 pm in Hollywood, CA. (Chart #11) She did not consult me beforehand, but called me right afterwards for my opinion. I did not have the heart to tell her that I saw a problem around her usual danger point, between 3 and 4 months. The Moon (in the 5th house) was applying to a square to Venus (in the 8th house of surgery) in 3 and 3/4 degrees. Now that could signify days, weeks or months, but with mutable signs we know it is not days but weeks, and in succedent (fixed) houses, we expect it to be months rather than weeks. I told her that since her other two losses happened around 3 plus months, she should be particularly careful around that time, such as more rest, less sports and so on.

Unfortunately she lost the baby in early December. By now she was nearly 37 years and at risk for a first pregnancy. Her doctor initiated a hormone therapy to strengthen the uterus and help prevent further miscarriages. He told her she could start trying again in July or August. I convinced her to let me run an astrological fertility cycle and see if any of the dates were close to her ovulation cycle. We found that if all went as calculated, her August ovulation would be 12 days off, September 9 days and by October the difference was down to 6 days. November was out, because her husband was scheduled to be at a special training seminar for five weeks. It took a bit of cajoling, but since Jennifer could not afford too many more failures, neither physically, psychologically or monetarily, she agreed to wait til October.

October 11th was the day and according to her doctor her appointment could be anywhere from 8:00 am to 10:00 pm. Since the different preparations, including getting the husband's sperm, would take at least 45 minutes, I calculated the chart for 8:45 am PDT. (Chart #12) Since the Moon at 3 Sagittarius is applying a square to Venus (half a degree) and Jupiter (the infamous three degrees), I immediately informed her that under no circumstances should she have the procedure done before 3:00 pm. They inseminated her at 3:30 pm (Chart #14).

The Moon will sextile the Sun, Mercury, Mars and the Ascendant. Nately the Moon still falls into her 4th house but is nearly in the 5th. It will trine the natal Ascendant, conjunct the Moon, oppose Jupiter and end with a trine to Pluto. Though fertility chart aspects to the natal chart are secondary in importance and rarely life threatening, I was curious if anything would happen around 12 weeks of pregnancy (Fertility Moon opposite natal Jupiter).

Jennifer had a very good pregnancy, but in her 4th month (12 weeks) she started gaining a lot of weight which she is still trying to get rid off. She had a healthy, roly-polly little girl on June 26, 1992 and as I am writing this book, has just called for help with another child which she hopes to conceive before the summer of 1995.

Please note that although the sperm was artificially inseminated, it took 48

hours to actually fertilize the egg; despite an early Sagittarius (masculine) Moon, she gave birth to a baby girl. Jennifer's doctor confirmed what I had been told earlier - in his experience 24 to 64 hours can be considered the average time span between insemination and fertilization.

These are just a few examples to get you started in this rather exciting new field. Please keep in mind that most of you are astrologers, not doctors. You can try to ease a pregnancy with so-called flowing aspects, but you cannot help anyone get pregnant if there is some physical obstruction or disability. You may help by bringing the astrological cycle and medical procedure as closely together as possible -- but please remember that this is not a science. It is a non-intrusive and therefore rather harmless way of helping nature and at times successful.

Since practice makes the master, here is a seven month 1978-79 fertility list for Mindy who wanted a second child by the time her boy 2 1/2 years old. See which date or dates you would have chosen for her.

In this day of medical advances, sooner or later I presume someone will ask me for a good day to give birth, because after all with Caesarian births there is a certain time leeway too. So far no one has asked and my expertise is strictly for pregnancies; I have no empirical experience with birth charts. Maybe someone will start working with it, but for myself I do not wish to decide when another human being is supposed to be born. I prefer to leave that to nature, God, the baby or whatever you feel starts life.

Mindy's timing was excellent. There were more 'good' and 'o.k.' dates than I usually encounter, especially in a seven months period.

Chart #1 - September 30, 1978 at 7:52 pm MEDT, Zurich, Switzerland

The Moon, though only at 19 Virgo, is void of course. I suggested that they try a few hours earlier, around 3:00 pm in order to catch the sextile to Venus at 17 Scorpio, yet avoid the square to Neptune at nearly 16 Sagittarius. They did, but nothing happened. I have noticed this phenomena a few times already whenever to fertility chart ends with a void of course Moon, regardless of how much earlier we try, but all of this is still experimental in my view, and I am not prepared as yet to definitely include or exclude anything.

Chart #2 - October 30, 1978 at 10:33:08 am MET, Zurich, Switzerland

The Moon at 18 Libra is again void of course and again, since there is no harm done, I suggested an earlier try at about 5:00 am in order to catch the sextile to Neptune and particularly the conjunction to Pluto, which I have found to be beneficial when it comes to reproduction of any kind. Again, no pregnancy.

Chart #3 - November 29, 1978 at 0:56:28 am MET, Zurich, Switzerland

The Moon at 18 Scorpio was again void of course, but at least it sextiled the Ascendant. I suggested trying half an hour earlier, to catch the sextile to Pluto, yet avoid the conjunction to Uranus as the Moon's first applying aspect. I needn't have worried...her husband was out of town.

Chart #4 - December 28, 1978 at 1:46:19 pm MET, Zurich, Switzerland

I kind of liked this chart which ends with a sextile to Pluto, though a conjunction to Neptune as the Moon's first applying aspect had fooled me a few times before and did it again this time. Neptune's elusive quality seems at times to play games of wishful thinking - because Mindy did not get pregnant. But she also admitted that she may have dropped the ball somewhere. The time I gave was between 6:00 am (past the Saturn square) and noon (1 hour 45 minutes before the actual peak); She thinks that her husband may have come home late for lunch at it was nearly 2:00 pm.

Chart #5 - January 27, 1979 at 1:09:43 am MET, Zurich, Switzerland

The Moon at 18 Capricorn squared Pluto, and though I like Pluto in pregnancy charts, I felt a square is a bit risky. But I liked the sextile to Uranus (ruling the Sun in this particular chart) and the conjunction to Mercury. I suggested to wait til 2:45 am.

She got pregnant and had a lovely little girl on October 12, 1979. Her Cancer Moon conjuncts her brother's Cancer Sun.

Chart #6 - February 25, 1979 at 11:22:40 am MET, Zurich, Switzerland

Chart #7 - March 26, 1979 at 8:42:16 pm MET, Zurich, Switzerland

It's lucky that Mindy got pregnant in January, because neither chart #6 nor #7 look good. #6 starts out with a lovely trine to Pluto, and even the Ascendant if we go a bit earlier, but then comes a square to Uranus, a definite "no." Chart #7 is not much better with a quincunx to Pluto and trine to Uranus, but next is a square to Neptune, another "no."
