MUNDANE ASTROLOGY

These notes are not an in depth study of Mundane Astrology, they are just a basic and rather elementary start to introduce you into this fascinating field. With these notes in hand and a good understanding of natal astrology, you can start to follow some of what's happening in the world.

Though "Astrology is always Astrology," Mundane or political astrology assigns additional and rather specific meanings to the houses, planets and signs. Just as in natal astrology, certain descriptions may fit the Moon, Cancer and/or the 4th house. When you are looking for the welfare of a president, prime minister or king, you may look to the Sun as well as the 10th house. The most important fact to keep in mind is that you are not dealing with individuals whose free will can make, shape and alter their destinies. You are dealing with countries, cities and masses of people who, as a group, usually react to the lowest common denominator.

ECLIPSES: In mundane astrology Solar and Lunar eclipses have been a popular base for predictions since day one - and they have always been greeted with awe and/or trepidation. On an average there are two Solar and two Lunar eclipses each year, but there are years with as many as seven eclipses. What makes Solar eclipses particularly noticeable is that they often presage the 'eclipse' of those in power. The old assumption was that as the Sun is blotted out, so are leaders of countries. Thank God as the Sun reappeared, new leaders would emerge. Of course today we know that all of this can only happen as the path of the eclipse tends to show which countries are drawn into history of the moment, as they "black out" a country at the time of totality or as it touches important points in the nation's or leader's chart.

Charles Emerson has come up with some fascinating research impacting world leaders; he shows that the eclipse-path prior to birth of future leaders seems to indicate the region of earth where their influence will be most felt.

SOLAR INGRESSES: Ingresses are based on the changing seasons and figured for the exact moment in time when the Sun enters Aries, Cancer, Libra and Capricorn respectively. These ingresses are called the Vernal or Spring Equinox, the Summer Solstice, the Autumnal or Fall Equinox and the Winter Solstice. They were of very great significance in the past when agriculture was a major occupation of the world's population, but they are still used extensively as a predictive tool for mundane happenings. The location in the chart where planets rise, set, culminate or conjunct the IC at the moment of the ingress will oftentimes show where major action takes place (of course according to the nature of the planet in question).

The Solar Ingress into Capricorn seems to be the most important for the governments of the world, since Capricorn is the sign of government. What this ingress indicates can affect relations with other countries on an international level all year long. The Solar Ingress can be calculated for any and all places in the world.

Lunations can also be quite revealing, but they cover a short span of time, whereas ingresses are considered valid for three months and eclipses, especially total solar ones) are considered in effect for up to two years.

The Mundane Houses

FIRST HOUSE: It represents the nation as a whole, a unitary political body. It is the physical terrain of the country, as well as the character of the people residing there. It may also represent the myth of the nation (United States Gemini Ascendant conjunct Uranus for the myth of freedom and versatility or the other often quoted Sagittarius rising for the myth of wide open spaces and freedom; Nazi Germany had Taurus rising - the myth of glorified physical action and solidity of the movement; Communist Russia has Virgo ascending: the myth of the worker's haven; England has Libra rising: the myth of 'fair play'.) The 1st house also describes the country's mass consciousness, public health, interior affairs of the country, majority in a political campaign, national traits and habits, as well as the prosperity of the people.

SECOND HOUSE: Describes all economic factors, the finances of the nation and financial condition of its people. It shows the means by which a nation sustains itself, its material resources, banks, financial resources, its wealth, national product and economy in general. It also represents the values of the society, what they really care for or 'hold dear'. All sources of revenue, commercial affairs and matters of trade are represented by the 2nd house. So are monetary reverses, fluctuations in the stock market, stocks, bonds, government investments and the secretary of the Treasury. The standard of living and the value this represents to the people is a 2nd house matter, so are budgets, currency, its circulation and control, national exports and taxation revenues. Also the kind of people the nation holds in high esteem (values).

THIRD HOUSE: This house is related to communications and transportation within the country, as well as publications, such as newspapers, as well as books that are printed in the language of the nation. Television, radio, telephones, telegraph, buses, trains, planes and automobiles and roads are all 3rd house matters. So is the press. The Postal Service, Federal Communications Commission, public schools and freedom of speech are also related to the 3rd house. Commonplace beliefs that form the basis for mutual understanding, a common language as well as a unified school system, are important 3rd house matters. Provincial or local governments and places, such as cities, counties and towns are also indicated by the 3rd house, as are neighboring countries.

FOURTH HOUSE: The 4th house represents family life and the accepted lifestyles of the population at large. It denotes the first settled communities as well as land and agriculture. Real Estate and all housing are 4th house matters; so are the produce of the land, parks, farming, mining and certain movements such as ecology. Territorial boundaries and their protection as well as emigration or immigration are 4th house concerns. The Department of the Interior, and the Immigration Bureau falls under 4th house jurisdiction. This house represents the foundation or base of society and its deeply rooted traditions; it represents the 'common people,' the opposition to the government as well as the opposition party. The weather is usually considered a 4th house matter.

FIFTH HOUSE: Representing all pleasures and enjoyments, the 5th house describes all show business such as theaters, movies and circuses as well as recreational centers, major sports, gambling and social functions. This house also rules children, the birth rate and some educational facilities, the creative arts and handcraft industries as well as artistic endeavors. All cultural centers such as concert halls, opera houses and museums fall under 5th house jurisdiction. Ambassadors from other countries (9th from the 9th) are considered 5th house

matters, so are speculations in all forms, thus linking certain parts of the economy to this house. Public morals or the morality of the State also belong to the 5th house.

SIXTH HOUSE: This house involves the workforce, the employed classes as well as their political institutions, such as trade unions or lobbying groups associated with labor (including the Department of Labor). Strikes start in the 6th house and end in the 12th. General means of production such as factories, service organizations and businesses are considered 6th house matters. Welfare organizations, public works, Civil Service and its employees, the Armed Forces and police and fire departments are all denoted by the 6th house. Public Health, public health workers and all epidemics are in the 6th house category. Though the communication involvement of the post office is considered a 3rd house matter, the civil servant part of its employees falls under the 6th house.

SEVENTH HOUSE: The 7th house relates to marriage or divorce rates and customs, marriage counseling, marriage license bureaus, Justices of the Peace as well as the public's attitude toward marriage. This house can reveal relations with other countries or societies as well as what we project on our enemies and fail to see about ourselves. All courts of law, judges, the Attorney General and legal proceedings under the adversary system and arbitration are denoted by the 7th house; so are foreign affairs and trade, foreign policies and relations, all formal diplomatic dealings, open enemies and allies, states of war and peace, treaties, international agreements and the national status among other nations. Last but not least, the general condition or status of women in the nation.

EIGHTH HOUSE: This house represents the financial relations important to the 7th house affairs, therefore all international finances such as the World Bank, currency exchanges, national frozen assets such as stocks and bonds, debts owed to and by other nations are 8th house matters, and the national debt is also partly represented by this house. The Internal Revenue Service, tariffs on foreign goods are other examples. The 8th house describes Social Security, retirement pensions, insurance, death rates, funeral customs, mortuaries, suicide, overthrow of or end of the existing state of government; political plots, public funerals, chemical warfare and poison gas are all 8th house matters.

NINTH HOUSE: This house is concerned with higher educational institutions, such as universities and colleges, foreign student exchange programs, publications in languages other than the one generally spoken within the country; religious organizations, foreign philosophies and cultures are also 9th house matters. All long-distance communication and transportation, especially shipping and air travel fall under 9th house jurisdiction. The U.S. Information Agency, Passport and Customs Service, Bureau of Naturalization and Immigration, commercial affairs and trade (national and international) as well as the Secretary of Commerce and State are denoted by the 9th house. Though the 7th house describes the legal system in its adversary role, the 9th represents the Supreme Court, courts of law as well as law and order and lawyers in general. It also relates to science in a broad sense and scientific institutions (but not specific scientific endeavors) and all types of ceremonies.

TENTH HOUSE: This house indicates governmental structure and organization, business in general, the State Department, the reputation of the nation in other countries as well as the national integrity, presidents, prime ministers, royalty (in other words, leaders of a country), the government and the particular 'ruling class' that leads the government; also mayors, governors,

aristocrats, celebrities and chairmen of the board. The Midheaven seems to indicate the ideals which society seeks to attain and consciously cultivate. Public policy as stated by political leaders and as shown by electoral mandates of the people or their representatives is also a 10th house matter. So are the national credit, money from foreign countries and the political party in power.

ELEVENTH HOUSE: All institutions that govern the nation are ruled by the 11th house: the legislature, legislative branches (distinct from 10th house administrative branches) the Senate and senators, Congress and congressmen, Parliament and all other type of government ruling bodies. It is said to relate to what we call 'friendly' foreign nations or international friendships. Humanitarian work and public institutions, fraternal organizations, clubs and societies of a national nature and civic organizations are also considered 10th house related; so are national aims, desires and purposes, projects and alliances as well as the will of the people.

TWELFTH HOUSE: This house rules all that remains totally or partly hidden. In terms of institutions it represents hospitals, homes for the mentally retarded, old age and retirement homes, monasteries, boarding schools, prisons, rehabilitative programs and places where people go to be alone. It also denotes such groups as the CIA, Interpol, the KGB, the Secret Service, the Mafia, crime and criminals, assassinations and assassins as well as all secret societies or clandestine groups, be they private or government controlled, legal or illegal. All charitable institutions and movements including welfare, but also graft and bribery are 12th house matters; so are concentrations camps, secret enemies of the nation, poisons and poverty.

The Mundane Planets

THE SUN: It indicates the essential character or state of a nation as well as its supreme authority (King, queen, president, prime minister or whatever the case may be); it denotes glory and honor as well as any high office held. The Sun rules large, shiny and showy things, castles, gold, jewelry, pomp, power in society, popularity, powerful persons, one's status, financial speculation, the stockmarket, stocks, stockbrokers, virility, vitality and willpower. Under disasters fall drought and nuclear contamination. It also rules **Sunday**.

THE MOON: The Moon represents the masses, the common people and the population at large. It specifically rules the women of the nation, both as individuals and the country's attitude or feelings toward the female nature and issues. The Moon also denotes popular opinion and mass ideologies, family life and national characteristics. It describes the mood of the people as well as their maternal instincts, lakes, rivers and oceans, ships and navigation, farmers and food purveyors (including markets and restaurants); it also denotes hotels and housing, plantlife in general and planting, public utilities and transportation. Its colors are iridescent as well as pale green. Under disasters fall floods, typhoons and bad harvests. It also rules **Monday**.

MERCURY: This planet represents the means by which people communicate with each other, whether by air, rail, sea, road, mail, speech or writing. It also describes a nation's educational system and schools, intellectual movements and intelligentsia, its trade and tradesmen as well as the skilled people who carry out the day to day tasks of the country. Printing and advertising, information

and the news, agreements and contracts, assemblies of people and especially young people all fall under Mercury's realm. So do buying and selling, stores and storekeepers, the computer and cars, languages and logic, history and mathematics, rumors, gossip and the Secretary of State. Under disasters fall air pollution and all transportation accidents, gas leaks and school fires. It also rules **Wednesday**.

VENUS: Beauty and pleasure loving, Venus represents all those things which make it pleasant for people to stay together, to function without repression. It describes artists and artisans, including museums, cultural centers and the fine arts. Celebrations and public festivities, gambling, entertainment and social pleasures are also Venusian matters. Venus can bring peace, but through its passionate nature it is also associated with war. Venus rules fashion, glamour, the 'bon vivants' and the feminine archetype. It also rules the nation's resources, its financial institutions, banks, treasury, circulation and control of currency, as well as protocol, births, birth rates and birth control, possessions of all kinds, sweets and cosmetics. Under disasters fall crop failures, lack of fertility and economic collapse. It also **Friday**.

MARS: This militant planet of course represents the military, the police forces, battlefields as well as activist figures. Mars also denotes the collective need of a nation or society to express itself aggressively, to fight wars, or to grow through asserting itself. Mars can also show internal violence through crime, riots or rebellion. It rules metals in general, iron and steel in particular, firearms and ammunition, assassinations, competitive sports and athletes, firemen and everything connected with fires. Sex, sexuality, sexual relations, pornography and males in general are represented by Mars. While alcohol is associated with Neptune and Pisces, tobacco falls under Mars' jurisdiction; similarly doctors are described by Mercury, Virgo and the 6th house, while Mars denotes surgeons. Under disasters fall fires, explosions, war, riots, violence, bloodshed and volcanoes. It also rules **Tuesday**.

JUPITER: Common values and belief systems are ruled by Jupiter, so are educational figures and those who form the national philosophy or ideology. Jupiter can express as freedom of thought and worship, with missionary zeal or even with political control as through a state religion. It represents the law, law courts (including the Supreme Court) and juries, churches and the clergy, all higher learning including universities, colleges and adult schools. It also describes the nation's sense of well being and in that sense is connected to prosperity and wealth, the rich and upper classes, banks and the financial life of the country. It shows the larger than life images or visions a nation aspires to and its heroes. It rules charities, publishing and advertising as well as foreign affairs and trade. Under disasters fall carelessness-caused mishaps, disasters caused by an overabundance of natural elements (snow, rain, sun, grasshoppers etc.), foreign invasion and disasters happening in densely populated regions. It also rules **Thursday**.

SATURN: Always feared and little understood, Saturn represents all that separates order from chaos; the forces of structure, history and government, the very foundations of society. The State and its institutions, and collectively, the amount of freedom a society permits or denies itself is denoted by Saturn. It governs the controlling forces in a country, such as the police or FBI and shows a nation's attitude toward law and order, authority and tradition. It rules conservatism, the economy, natural resources including land and minerals. It also rules the nation's past, its elderly citizens and its mortality rate. It is

The Signs of the Zodiac

The signs have less impact than planets and houses, but they still have some bearings, especially as they relate to horoscopes of countries. The Cancer Sun for example well describes the tradition of family life in the United States. But countries' horoscopes change as their constitution is overthrown or new nations are formed out of old ones. There are quite a few books available giving data on countries, but be sure to look carefully which ones are based on actual data and which ones are rectified or erected for high noon. The same principle that applies to countries of course also works for states and cities. The signs in mundane astrology mean pretty much what they do in natal astrology as applied to an individual. Here are a few extra keywords to get you going:

ARIES Leadership, all that is new such as recently plowed or virgin lands, fire and things made by fire or occupations connected with fire, heat, including heat exhaustion, hilly places, cutting or sharp instruments, surgical operations, operating rooms and objects used in them; iron ores, things made of iron and places where iron is stored; military matters, all military men and professions; the color red, including red stones and rocks.

TAURUS: Many things connected with culture and the arts, including artists, music, sculpture and architecture; beautiful objects such as jewelry and precious stones; all possessions; banks, banking, currency and its circulation, financial affairs, treasurers and treasuries; cattle, copper and pastel colors.

GEMINI: All forms of communicating and disseminating information including advertising, broadcasting, computers, gossip, journalism, the press, letters, printing, telegrams and telephones. (Television, by the way, falls under Uranus/Aquarius, not Gemini). Most forms of transportation such as cars, buses, cabs, roads, rails, trains, rivers and boats as well as travel and traffic. Education, intellect and intelligence, so of course schools, books and libraries, literature, publishing, storytelling and writing are all Gemini matters. Also mercury, the nervous system and the color violet.

CANCER: All liquids, such as most forms of water, pools, brooks, streams, oceans. Agriculture; food and purveyors of food, restaurants, groceries (This category is also ruled by Virgo); many buildings including houses and hotels. Silver; municipal politics; iridescent and opalescent hues of colors as well as green.

LEO: All forms of amusement and entertainment, including circuses, gambling, motion pictures, film stars, impresarios, theaters and more. Children in general as well as birth rates and birth control. Money lenders and changers, financial and public speculation; rulers, royalty, high society and their doings; the colors yellow, orange and gold.

VIRGO: Administrators; armed forces; clerks and clerical work, including bookkeepers and such, but also mathematicians; the working class in general; health and disease, including public health, doctors, nurses and humane societies. All clothing, craftsmen and craftsmanship; efficiency experts, critics, editors. Municipal and national service as well as the country's capacity for service; meadows and harvests; mercury and deep, navy or indigo blues.

LIBRA: Pure and clear air (hot and humid air denoted by Leo, air in general by Uranus, air conditioning by Saturn/Capricorn); armistices as well as diplomacy and pacificism; trials, arbitrations, litigations and warfare; artists and arts of all kinds, including music, poetry, painting; copper; beautiful objects, but also beauticians, beauty parlors, cosmetics, decorators, fashion, clothing and dressmakers. Partnerships as well as marriages and divorces; contracts; flowers; luxury; social functions; colors include cloudy art tints, corals and crimsons.

SCORPIO: Research, chemistry, chemists, drug stores and druggists; death, life after death, death rates, legacies, funerals, cemeteries, crematories, coroners. espionage, treachery and mob fury; magic and magicians. Poisonous plants; rubbish dumps, cesspools, toilets. Surgery and surgeons; taxes, tax collectors, tariffs and insurance. Sense of smell, sex in all its involvements including intercourse, organs, diseases. Colors are murky shades, browns, deep blood or scarlet reds.

SAGITTARIUS: Foreign countries, agencies and trade; ammunition depots; ceremonies. All higher education and professors, colleges, universities; higher thoughts and philosophies as well as enduring literature. Commerce in general as well as international commerce; customs, tariffs and imports. Legal profession, legal affairs, law courts as well as supreme courts; scientific institutions and publications. Religion, religious organization, theologies, churches, ministers, priests and clergymen; morality. Colors are rich full hues as well as olive and pale green.

CAPRICORN: Land in general, including barren ground, ranches, farms, fields and grain. Business in general, business matters and districts, civil service and employees, government officials, activities and service, buying and selling. Builders, buildings, contractors. Minerals in general, lead, mines and mining; lumber. Technology; slums. Colors are dark, including dark brown, gray and black

AQUARIUS: Aeronautics, airplanes and airports; radio and television as well as their announcers, telephone and telegraph. Clubs, club members, social affairs, functions and sociability; photography and photographic supplies; electricity, electric appliances, electronics and their technicians. Congress, House of Representatives, of Commons, Senate, parliaments and all legislative branches. Modernization, new teachings and occupations; reforms and reformers, rebellion and rebels, political revolutions or revolts. Colors are electric or changeable. Astrology by the way is ruled by Aquarius and Uranus, but also by Neptune/Pisces and the 7th house.

PISCES: Alcohol, alcoholism, distilleries, bartenders. Hospitals and their workers, sanatoriums, anesthetics; habit forming drugs, drug addiction, drugs which produce unconsciousness or sleep; sleep and somnambulism. Fishing boats, fishermen, nets, aquariums; swimming and swimming pools. Charity, charitable movements and institutions, also institutions of confinement, correction or detention; conspiracies and confinement, secret enemies, clandestine associations and spies. Gas, gasoline and oil. Mediumships, spiritualism, occultism and psychics. The deep sea, fog. Photography and photographs (together with Uranus/Aquarius). Colors are deep values or white.

interesting to keep in mind that for example a cathedral is ruled both by Jupiter (religion, large, beautiful) and Saturn (traditional, a bit austere and old). Under disasters fall land and rock slides, famine, mining cave-ins, severe extremes of snowy winters or drought-dry summers. Saturn also rules **Saturday**.

URANUS: Its discovery occurred during the industrial revolution as well as the French and American revolutions, and mundanely Uranus is linked to all that's innovative or revolutionary and often signifies changes and upheavals at all levels in a country. It rules economic change, strikes, political dissidents, reforms, inventions, new technology and all that is considered 'avant garde' in the nation. Astrology and astrologers as well as astronomy and astronomers are supposedly part of Uranus' realm. So are aeronautics, airplanes and air travel, broadcasting, television and the movies, cars and buses and electricity. Catastrophies as well as humanitarianism, freedom and liberalism as well as segregation, magic and miracles, phonographs and photography are all considered Uranian happenings. Under disasters fall hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes, lightning fires, electrical fires and electrocution, explosions, bloody revolts, guerilla warfare and aircraft crashes.

NEPTUNE: More than any other planet, Neptune is associated with subversion, but it also rules all new visions or dreams of the perfect society. It represents the collective need for perfection or ideal solutions, but most of the time it dissolves into disillusion and even delusion, it can signify deception as well as confusion or the rose colored glasses. It also describes a nation's self-image and that which it wishes to project onto others; it denotes glamor and charisma, but also inflation and fear. It represents the isolated pockets in society, the splinter groups, those that are outside the mainstream of the nation as well as exiles. Neptune rules oil and gasoline as well as gas, alcoholics and artists, hospitals and jails, drugs, recreational or prescribed; whereas Uranus rules homosexuality, Neptune rules bi-sexuality. It was discovered at the time of the first explorations into the psyche and of course rules psychology and psychoanalysis. Under disasters fall da, breaks, ships sinkings, tidal waves, drownings, contagious epidemics, floods, vermin infestation of crops (rats, grasshoppers, weevils etc.)

PLUTO: Pluto represents all hidden forces, both subversive and helpful, operating unseen in society. Pluto rules from the trivial level of sewage workers to the more sinister level of the secret police, organized crime and self-destructive impulses. It rules what Jung called "psychotic outbreaks in the collective unconscious." But Pluto also represents the healing principle which forces change in order to get well. Pluto's rule over the underworld includes poisons, murder, dictators, abduction, annihilation, morgues, hell and brimstone, death, the atomic bomb; but it also includes life after death, atomic energy, sex organs and sexual intercourse (both legitimate and extramarital). True to the Phoenix, the mythical bird that so well describes Pluto, the words that always apply to this planet are destruction and resurrection. Under disasters fall volcanoes, earthquakes, oil spills, war, all nuclear accidents, and anything involving widespread death and/or destruction.

Please remember that many things are ruled by more than one sign, house or planet. For example HEROES fall under the jurisdiction of Mars (bravery etc.) and the Sun (applause, acclaim, recognition etc.) The same applies to many other subjects.
